Pro-Israel

Pro-Israel PACs—Political Action Committees—outnumber and outspend their pro-Arab counterparts, according to a recent MIDEAST OBSERVER study of Federal Election Commission (FEC) data.

33 pro-Israel PACs contributed more than \$1.8 million to 268 different election campaigns during the 1981-82 FEC reporting cycle.

On the other side, the pro-Arab PACs are in their earliest stages of development. The MIDEAST OBSERVER found only two pro-Arab PACs: Americans for Lebanon Political Action Committee (ALPAC) and Middle East PAC (M-PAC).

ALPAC is more closely associated with the political views of ALL (the American Lebanese League) than with NAAA (the National Association of Arab Americans). ALPAC contributed a total of \$5,500 to six candidates in the 1982 election. It gave \$1,000 each to the campaigns of Senators Mitchell (D-ME) and Wilson (R-CA) and to Representatives Hamilton (D-IN), Hiler (R-IN), and Kazen (D-TX). Also, it gave \$500 to the unsuccessful effort of Richard Anter, an Ohio Republican, to gain the held by seat eventually Ed Feighan (D-OH).

M-PAC is only newly formed. It is headed by James Zogby, Executive Director of the American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee (ADC). Zogby told the MIDEAST OBSERVER, and FEC records confirmed, that there has been "zero money in; and zero out."

To date, that is the extent of the pro-Arab, single issue PACs. As Ed Roeder, editor of the authoritative "PACs Americana", told the MIDEAST OB-SERVER early in this study as we sought for pro-Arab PACs: "There's no balance on this one."

PACs

The 20 senatorial candidates actually elected in 1982 that received more than \$10,000 from pro-Israel PACs are, along with their dollar amounts: \$77,400 George Mitchell (D-ME) \$58,250 James Sasser (D-TN) \$56,000 D. Durenberger (R-MN) \$55,500 Robert Byrd (D-WV) \$48,500 Paul Sarbanes (D-MD) \$46,500 Chic Hecht (R-NV) \$44,775 Quentin Burdick (D-ND) \$42,075 Lowell Weicker (R-CT) \$36,575 Jeff Bingaman (D-NM) \$35,175 H. Metzenbaum (D-OH) \$32,000 D. Many more Democrats than Republicans enjoyed the support of the pro-Israel PACs. For example, all 16 House candidates receiving more than \$10,000 each from these PACs were Democrats, and less than one-third (nearly one-quarter) of the 215 House candidates supported by these PACs were Republicans.

On the Senate side, only six Republicans were among the 26 senatorial candidates who got more than \$10,000 each.

A large amount of money— \$232,600 altogether—went to five incumbents on the Senate Appropriations Committee. The five: Sasser (D-TN), Byrd (D-WV), Burdick (D-ND), DeConcini (D-AZ), and Weicker (R-CT). The biggest single recipient of pro-Israel PAC money was Richard Durbin (D-IL). He received \$103,325 from 31 of the 33 pro-Israel PACs (see the listing of them on page 2). Durbin defeated Republican Paul Findley who held the ranking minority position on the House Mideast panel.

News Briefs

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O'NEILL'S MIDEAST PANEL

During the debate on whether or not to authorize U.S. forces in Lebanon, House Speaker Tip O'Neill promised to monitor personally the situation in Lebanon. To that end, he has set up the "Speaker's Ad Hoc Lebanon Monitoring Group."

The Group's members, all Democrats, are: O'Neill(MA), Wright (TX), Foley (WA), Alexander (AR), Zablocki (WI), Williams (MT), Mikulski (MD), Gejdenson (CT), Bonior (MI), Rahall (WV), Hawkins (D-CA), Smith (FL), Matsui (CA), Hamilton-(IN) and Murtha-(PA).

In its first meeting on October 24, the committee met for two hours in a closed door session with Secretary of State Shultz and Defense Secretary Weinberger.

During that session, O'Neill reports that the Committee firstly expressed its "overwhelming concern" for the safety and security of U.S. troops in Beirut. Secondly, the O'Neill-led group urged the Administration to greatly accelerate and expand its diplomatic initiatives to get foreign troops out of Lebanon and to create a government of national reconciliation. And, finally, "the committee," according to O'Neill, "strongly urged that a highly respected and experienced individual be named to replace Ambassador Robert McFarlane" as Mideast peace negotiator.

MURPHY TAKES TOP STATE SPOT

Richard W. Murphy succeeds Nicholas Veliotes as Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern and South Asian Affairs—the State Department's top_Mideast post.

When first appointed there was some initial opposition in Congress because Murphy, an "Arabist", has extensive experience in the Arab world but not in Israel. He has served in posts in Syria and Jordan and held Ambassadorships in three Arab countries—Syria, Mauritania and Saudi Arabia.

Murphy, however, disarmed his opponents with successful diplomacy. Prior to his Senate Foreign Relations Committee confirmation hearing on October 18, Murphy visited Israel and also made the rounds visiting various Senators. Apparently, he won them over. Senator Rudy Boschwitz (R-MN), chairing the hearing, praised Murphy's "formidable" qualifications, saying that he "comes with a broader background than anyone else" who has appeared before Boschwitz for confirmation to a Mideast post.

Senator Pressler (R-SD), arriving near the end of the hearing, raised the one question about Arabists and their reputed favoritism toward the Arabs.

"...to Murphy's reply: label a whole class of foreign service officers as pro-oneside or the other because of their service in that area I think is most unfair. I notice you don't hear it said about our officers that spend an equal amount of time studying Russian. We don't assume that they are automatically Communist sympathisers. And I hope that the perversion of the word "Arabists" in the American vocabulary will begin to disappear."

While substantively U.S. Mideast policy is unlikely to change due to Murphy's appointment, the effectiveness of U.S. diplomacy may be enhanced.
